Funmilola Fagbamila, artist

Funmilola Fagbamila is a Nigerian-American playwright, actress and professor. Her internationally touring stage play on the complexities of Black political identity, The Intersection, has been met with critical acclaim by thinkers and artists such as Angela Davis and Erykah Badu. The production premiered at the Pan African Film Festival in 2018; and has staged in venues across the U.S., England, France, the Netherlands and Brazil. Funmilola currently serves as professor of Pan African Studies at California State University, Los Angeles and is a founding member of Black Lives Matter. Her work was honored by the US Congress in both 2015 and 2018; and her writing and social commentary have been featured in publications such as the Guardian, BBC News and NPR.

Tolu Ekisola, narrator

Feyintoluwa (Tolu) Ekisola is an actor, writer, dancer, and producer from Rogers, Minnesota. Originally from Abeokuta, Nigeria, her work is infused with world history with a focus on Africa and the African Diaspora.
